



2023 Student Perception Survey ANNUAL REPORT



The MI Student Voice Perception Survey was developed by Michigan Superintendents in 2019 to address the need for a common measure to provide a holistic picture of student experience.

Following a pilot test, early support quickly expanded administration to 20 districts in 2022 as part of a growing statewide consortium.

In the spring of 2023, 58 districts across the state of Michigan administered the the MI Student Voice Perception Survey in their schools - nearly tripling participation in one year and capturing critical information from 33,366 total students.

The survey is now playing a transformative role in how education leaders approach district and school improvement planning by prioritizing the voice of students.



MAKING THE RESULTS ACTIONABLE



Currently, some school districts are using survey results with other systems that are already available, such as MICIP, to create their data stories and show how they utilize the data for school improvement. This fall, Kent ISD will host a dynamic training session on using the data to integrate student voice into continuous improvement planning. This dynamic session will focus on:

- Analyzing the MI Student Voice Perception Survey data
- Identifying patterns and trends in the data
- Using insights to make informed decisions that promote continuous improvement
- Developing an action plan that addresses survey concerns and meets the needs of the students

2023 KEY DATA TAKEAWAYS

Statewide aggregate data provides the opportunity for individual districts to see where they fall compared to the state as a whole. Key takeaways from the statewide data demonstrate that there is indeed work to be done:

STUDENT ENGAGEMENT

- Student Engagement is higher in elementary grades than in middle or high school. Further research suggests that Classroom Climate seems to be the issue.
- Growth Mindset is notably higher in elementary grades compared to high school grades. It is also significantly lower in students who identify as non-binary and those who prefer to self-describe their gender identity.

BELONGING

• On average, students in elementary grades have a higher sense of Belonging than students in high school. Additional analysis shows that students struggle with Relationships and Cultural Awareness.

SOCIAL-EMOTIONAL LEARNING (SEL)

- About 1 in 5 students have low SEL skills.
- Analysis shows that gaps exist in SEL primarily due to Relationships and Responsible Decision-Making.
 - * On average, White students have higher SEL scores than Black or African American students or Hispanic students.
 - * Non-binary students and students that prefer to self-describe their gender identity have lower SEL scores than female or male students.

ADMINISTERING THE SURVEY



- The MI Student Voice Perception Survey is designed for students in grades 5-12. It consists of under 40 questions and takes less than 10 minutes to complete.
- Questions fall within three critical domains: Student Engagement, Belonging and Social Emotional Learning (SEL).
- Applying best practices in survey methodology, prompts are expressed as questions. Additionally, responses are collected using a five-point Likert scale for frequency and perception.
- Each participating district has the opportunity to customize their survey by selecting which of the three domains they wish to include and which grade levels to administer to.
- Additionally, districts can choose which gender identity categories to include or to skip the gender identity category altogether.
- Districts receive a toolkit with templated materials designed to make implementation of the survey as seamless as possible. These included suggested communications to principals, teachers, parents and students.
- Students can take the survey on a computer, tablet or mobile device by accessing a custom online weblink; all responses are anonymous.
- Reports are distributed to all participating districts, which include building, district and state aggregate data for comparison purposes. All participating districts have the opportunity to attend a virtual session to learn how to interpret the data and aggregate data from across the state for comparison purposes.

WHY STUDENT VOICE MATTERS

In Michigan, there is currently no uniform measurement of students' wellbeing nor a common way to evaluate student engagement and the impact of related social emotional learning opportunities for students beyond standardized test scores. The research, however, is crystal clear about the significant role that student engagement and student belonging play in student success. **Engaged students are 2.5 times more likely to say they do well in school and 4.5 times more likely to be hopeful about the future.** ¹

The MI Student Voice Perception Survey was developed in response to this void and is designed to measure student perceptions across Student Engagement, Belonging and Social-Emotional Learning with the goal of enabling schools to identify, develop and implement effective strategies and interventions. Data from this survey helps to open the door for reexamination of school quality beyond the limited picture of test scores.

PUBLIC OPINION AFFIRMS NEED FOR ASSESSMENT ON STUDENT ENGAGEMENT



"The survey allows students to get their opinions in on education and how they're feeling. Standardized testing is great for education, but the mental aspect and how people actual feel is also just as important. I think the survey is important because it shows students and where they're at on a deeper level than just testing."

In Summer 2023, a public opinion poll was commissioned with EPIC-MRA to better understand public sentiment around engagement. EPIC-MRA administered live telephone interviews with 600 active and likely votes. The results loudly validate the importance of our work in student voice and engagement. We will be using this data to inform our messaging and advocacy with scholars, parents, educators, policy makers and the general public.

Notable highlights:

- 79% of respondents believe that students' performance should be graded on much more than just standardized test scores.
- 60% of respondents believe student engagement is more important than standardized tests when it comes to measuring classroom performance and understanding whether students are learning the material they are being taught.
- 75% of respondents think it is important for their local public school district to join with other Michigan public school districts in adopting policies that have proven to increase the level of student engagement both in Michigan and nationwide.









NEW: SUITE OF SURVEYS



This year also saw the development of two new surveys under the MI Student Voice umbrella. Both the Parent Perspective Survey and Educator Perspective Survey will be available for pilot testing in Spring 2024. The addition of these surveys provides districts with the opportunity to triangulate the data across three key stakeholder groups – students, parents, educators – for a more holistic approach to improve measures of school quality in their school improvement plans.

As with the Student Perception Survey, templated communication materials will be developed to help streamline administration of the surveys, which will take place during the same administration windows.

Administration of the Parent and Educator Perception Surveys is not required for



participation in the Student Perception Survey.
